The Public Safety Department provides various types of law enforcement services and programs to the residents of the Municipal District of Bonnyville. We provide these services on a 24-hour per day, 365 days a year using shift work and on call workers.

- 10 Internal reports of theft and vandalism to municipal equipment and facilities investigated

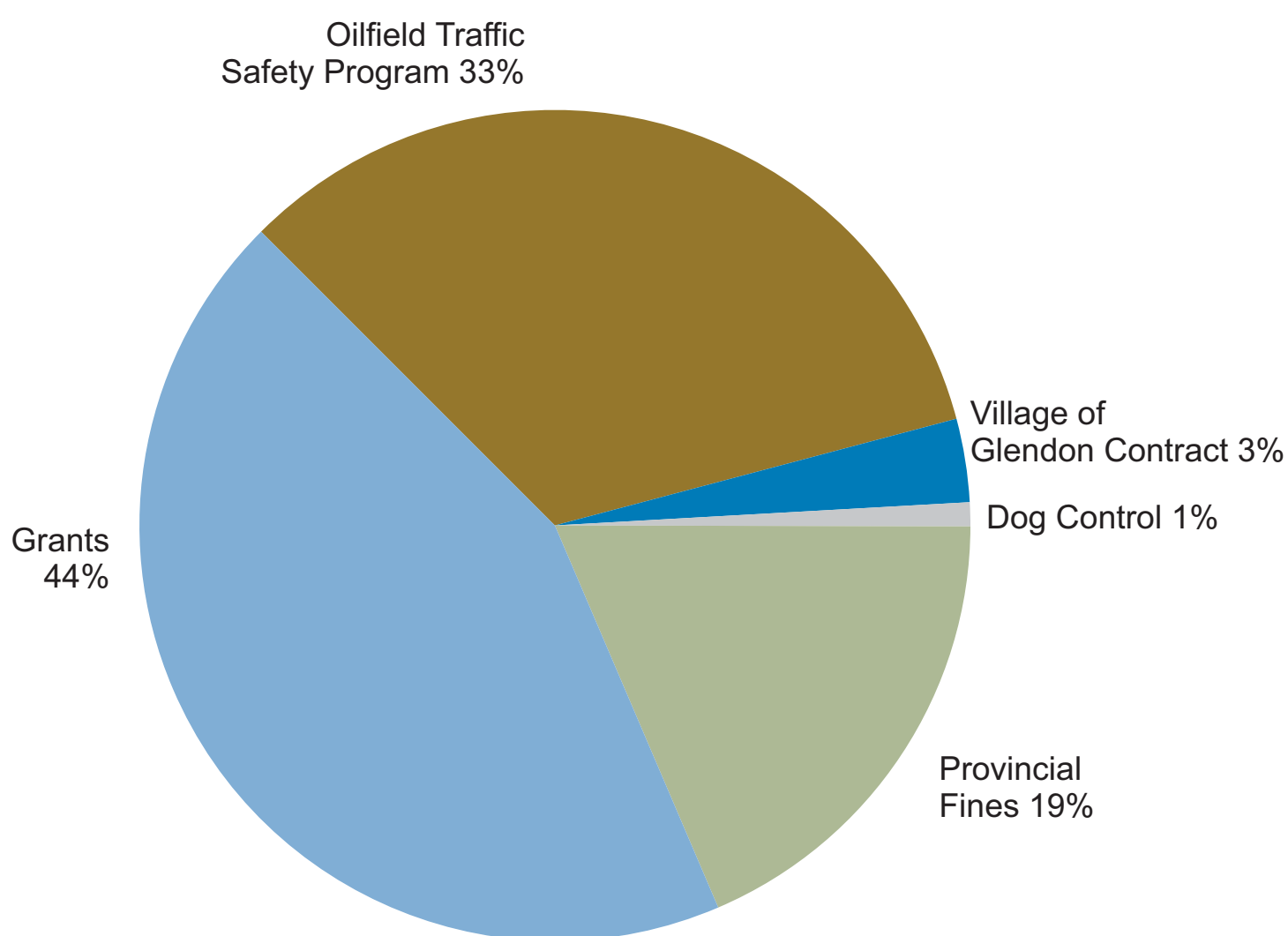

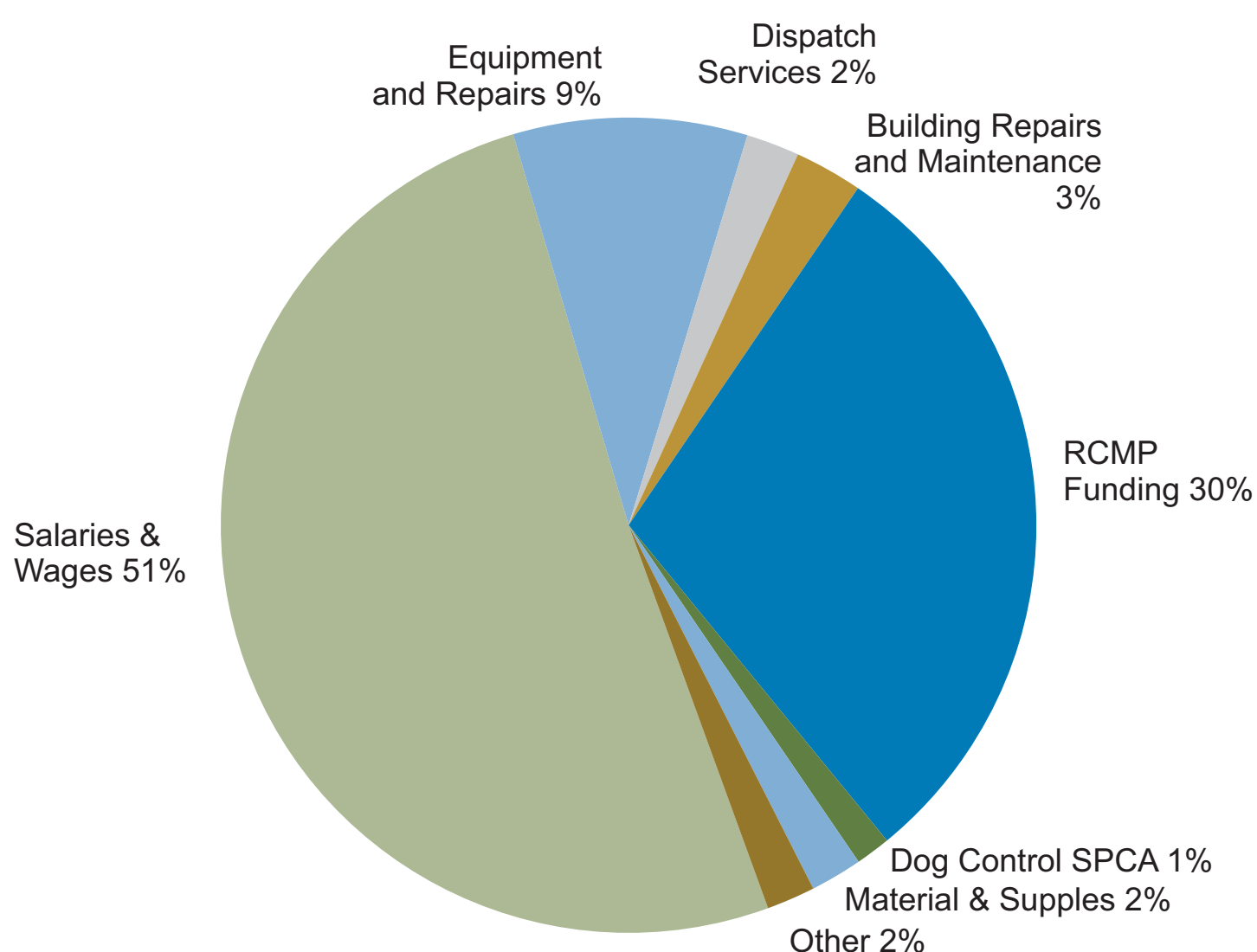


Budget Highlights

Our crime prevention officer is responsible for our vacant home check service, conducting our Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design Surveys to all municipal property owners, one on one consultations with residents, and operating the municipalities various crime prevention programs.



The Public Safety Department has a crime prevention focus by patrolling all over the municipality. Our officers provide general and targeted crime prevention patrols to deter the incidents of crime in our rural communities. The department work very closely with the Cold Lake and Bonnyville RCMP to ensure areas of concern are getting the extras patrols necessary to deter criminal activity.



As the Municipal District of Bonnyville has a heavy volume of industry traffic on Municipal District roads, the Public Safety Department works directly with local oil producing companies to enhance traffic safety. This is done by enforcing provincial traffic laws, Commercial Vehicle Inspections for safety purposes and targeting problem locations. Educating drivers are required safety requirements.
